Mission Statement

The Oak Island Fire Department mission

The Mission of the Oak Island Fire Department is to preserve the lives and protect the property of its residents and visitors through fire prevention and education, fire and rescue response, and emergency medical care, and to provide service, support and dedication to the citizens, the Town, and our families.

Staffing (Current)

- 7 full time shift personnel each day.
 - 1 Captain, 1 Lieutenant, 5 Firefighters
- 10 Part time personnel on roster
- 2 Administrative Chiefs
- 1 Administrative Assistant
- 3 Volunteers (two are investigators)

We have some of the best and most dedicated staff and I am very proud of the job that they do each day.

 - 2 on search
 - 2 on ventilation
 - 1 pump operator engine
 - 1 pump operator tower
 - 3 RIT crew
 - 1 command officer

Staffing

- Medium Hazard
- 28 Firefighters
- High Hazard
- 43 Firefighters

Recruiting

- The Oak Island Fire Department is very successful in recruiting new members.
- Last October we had 7 vacant positions, and 3 new positions. Since then, we promoted one Asst. Chief, 3 Captains, 3 Lieutenants and hired 10 people to achieve full staffing, to provide protection to the citizens of Oak Island.

How did we do this?

- We offer a very competitive salary and benefits package
- We take care of our members
- We provide a positive, hands-on work environment

Training

- We provide a variety of training opportunities for our staff members.
- We send members to specialty classes and conferences
- We are also a direct delivery agency, which allows us to certify our members “in-house” with State certifications
- Our members train daily with their individual shifts
- We train with other departments on a frequent basis
- We have recorded more than 3,500 training hours this year

Levels of Service

- The Oak Island Fire Department provides a wide variety of services to the Town.
 - Fire Suppression
 - All our staff members are certified to Firefighter level II or greater
 - We have multiple members Certified in Aircraft Fire Suppression
 - We deploy some of the latest technology when providing fire suppression
 - High-volume low-pressure nozzles – larger attack lines – aggressive interior suppression when appropriate
 - Rescue
 - All staff members are certified in a variety of rescue specialties.
 - Extrication
 - Water Rescue
 - Confined Space / Collapse

Levels of Service (continued)

- EMS
 - All staff members are certified EMT Basic level or higher
- Educational
 - The OIFD is a delivery Agency, which means we can teach/certify our own members
 - We currently have 8 instructors on staff who cover various areas
- Fire Prevention (FLSE, Fire Life Safety and Education)
 - The OIFD has multiple members certified in fire life safety education programs

- We have developed an aggressive and efficient equipment replacement plan for Oak Island
- We replaced all our 800 mgz radios this past year
- Replacement of SCBA Air Packs, 4 each year as they age out (10 years)
- Replacement of PPE turn out gear, 5 sets each year as it ages out
We just ordered the second set of gear for each member.
- Replacement of thermal image cameras
- Upgrade of PPV (Positive Pressure Ventilation) fans
- Upgrade of Computer systems
- Upgrade of fire hose and other suppression equipment

Call Statistics

- 2022 – 1,748 calls for service
- 2023 estimated – 1,800 Calls for service
- So Far...1/1/2023 to 8/1/2023 we have been dispatched to 970 calls for service
 - 53 structure fires
 - 375 medical calls
 - 16 cardiac arrest
 - 24 motor vehicle accidents
 - 36 water rescues
 - 65 EMS calls on the beach strand
 - 115 assist invalid calls (lift assist)
 - 75 fire alarms
 - The remainder of the calls are service calls, false alarms and calls to aid other districts
 - Overlapping calls is when we have more than one calls going on at one time.
 - Our overlapping call percentage is 28%


Call Statistics

Getting back to the 28%

Accepted practice states that when you have overlapping calls more than 25%, you need to add stations, add companies, or both.

Beach Patrol Unit / Water Rescue Unit

- The Oak Island Fire Department began a Beach Patrol Unit this season. The unit utilizes a QRV and patrols the beach strand. This unit, on its first dispatch of the year, made a life saving rescue, Memorial Day Weekend. This unit utilizes 2 Firefighter/Rescue members who patrol and respond to any Water Rescue on the Island as well as any medical calls on the beach strand.



Beach Patrol Unit / Water Rescue Unit

On August 1, we also placed a Watercraft Rescue Unit (Sea-Doo Personal Watercraft) into service. This unit is capable of a rapid response by either surf launching or ramp launching. It is equipped with a rescue board that is towed by the Rescue Watercraft. This unit has been deployed to 3 calls for service; 2 of them resulted in the rescue of inflatable rafts offshore and one was kayakers in distress. This unit can be deployed into the water on average within 7 minutes of notification of an emergency.



Staffing (For the Future)

- 14 Full Time each day
 - 3 Full staffed engines
 - 1 Full staffed Tower/Ladder
 - 1 full staffed beach patrol/QRV first response unit
- 10 Part time personnel on roster
- 3 Administrative Chiefs
- 1 Administrative Assistant
- Volunteers, (promote volunteer program)

Apparatus/Equipment Needs for Future

- 2024 Sea-Doo Rescue Watercraft to give us 2 units
- 2024 Ford F-150 to replace Asst. Chief's vehicle
- 2024 Pierce Mid Mount Tower Ladder to replace existing older tower unit
This unit would be delivered in 2025-2026
- 2025 Ford F-150 to replace Beach Patrol unit (190)
- 2027 Mini Pumper for Station 4 Location
- 2029 Replacement of Smeal 100' Tower
- 2036 Replacement of 2023 Pierce Enforcer, (Moving unit to reserve)

Stations

- We currently have 3 stations. Two are staffed 24 hours a day.
- The plan is to build the 4th station within the next 3 years to cover the areas of Pine Forest and the growth on the mainland and to staff all stations.
- We are currently enhancing the conditions of the stations with paint and light remodeling.

ISO (Insurance Rating)

The Town of Oak Island carries an ISO rating of 3/10

Our Next ISO inspection will be coming up in 2024/2025

An ISO fire rating is a score provided to fire departments and insurance companies by the Insurance Services Office (ISO). The score reflects how prepared a community and area is for fires. While it mainly focuses on the local fire departments and water supply, there are other factors that contribute to an area's score.

The ISO score affects the insurance premium for your home or business
