Council Meeting Recap

The Town Council's regular meeting on **Tuesday, June 20, 2023** began with three PRESENTATIONS. **(1)** Certificate of Appreciation for Kamdyn Wood, for his efforts in fulfilling the 2022 pledge from the South Brunswick Middle School Junior Honor Society to water various trees throughout Town. **(2)** Life Saving Pins were awarded to firefighters Mike Young, Chris Dunham, and volunteer firefighter Mike Malady for a successful water rescue made on May 25. **(3)** A Certificate of Appreciation was presented to Beach Services Unit employee Bob Kohunt, for his actions in performing a water rescue on June 12.

PUBLIC HEARINGS (1) Proposed text amendments to Section 6.5 and Appendix A related to "Amusement Facilities": Council voted to remand the text amendment back to the Planning Board for further development. **(2) Proposed text amendments to Chapter 32 of the Code of Ordinances - Vegetation:** Council voted to delay the vegetation ordinance until no later than October, upon completion of a Tree Canopy Assessment and Stakeholders Meeting.

PRESENTATION: Abram Young, Special Projects Coordinator for Brunswick County Mosquito Control, gave a presentation on the County's Mosquito Control Program.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS: Council appointed Elise Snavelly, David Sonnenfeld, and Sue Davidson to the Environmental Advisory Committee for terms ending in December 2026; and John Schading to the Recreation Advisory Board, term ending 2025.

OLD BUSINESS: **(1) Proposed Amendment to Chapter 28 of the Code of Ordinances - Traffic:** Council voted to approved the proposed amendment.

NEW BUSINESS: **(1) Consideration of Amendment to the 2023 Town Council Meeting Schedule:** Council approved the amended schedule, moving the September meeting to the 7th instead of the second Tuesday. **(2) Consideration of Contract with Oak Island Water Rescue:** Council voted to accept the contract as presented. **(3) Consideration of Lease for the Oak Island Water Rescue Station property:** Council voted to approve the lease for the term of one-year. **(4) Consideration of Consent Agreement with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (for soil sample collection):** Council voted to approve the consent agreement.

CLOSED SESSION: Council voted to enter into closed session, during which no action was taken. Council then voted to adjourn. Beach Day Brings The Crowds

Sandcastles, cornhole, concerts ... and **MORE!** Whether it was the good weather, or the great events planned, the annual anniversary of the Town of Oak Island's founding drew record crowds this July 1st for **BEACH DAY** celebrations.

Commemorating the July 1, 1999 merger of the Towns of Yaupon Beach & Long Beach into what is today known as the Town of Oak Island, this year's Beach Day marked the Town's 24th birthday. This year's schedule did not disappoint, as it was filled with fun and family-friendly activities organized by the Oak Island Recreation Department. Continuing on a partnership now several years strong, Beach Day events were also held in collaboration with the North Carolina 4th of July Festival.

Events organized by the Oak Island Recreation Department began early in the day at 8:00 AM, with a horseshoe tournament in the Middleton Park Complex. That quiet competition soon gave way to the joyful squeals of children, as inflatable rides, youth activities, and food concessions filled the Complex in the mid-day hours. Meanwhile over on the beach itself, game tournaments included cornhole, bocce ball, and volleyball, followed by a sandcastle competition.

Back over at the Amphitheater, *The Carl Newton Review* provided some good music in a live concert. Of course, it would be hard to talk about Beach Day without mentioning the most anticipated part ... **the fireworks!** Local music favorite *The Doormen* entertained crowds near the Oak Island Pier from 6:00 PM - 9:00 PM; after which came an amazing fireworks display that many said was "*one of the best ever!*"

As mentioned, this year marked the 24th Anniversary of the town's founding. As you may have guessed, plans are already underway to make next year's 25th Anniversary even better than ever! Cabana Remodel Complete

On Friday, May 12, the SE 46th Street Cabana was CLOSED to accommodate a complete renovation effort. While the timing of the closure at the start of the Summer season wasn't ideal, it was the most immediate availability of the remodeling contractors, which would still allow for a summer 2023 use.

Thankfully, those renovations (and the closure they caused) were ultimately short-lived. During the last week in June, the construction tape came down and the work trucks rolled out, reopening the Cabana just in time for Beach Day activities!

Improvements provided by the renovated facility include all new decking for the walkways, stairs, access ramps, and observations deck. New foot rinsing spigots, as well as a brand new Shower tower were also installed, in addition to a remodel of the restrooms themselves. The Cabana has retained its iconic peach colored exterior of the past few years.

These much-needed updates should greatly extend the life of the Oak Island Cabana, and allow for several more years of service to the community.

Fire Department Safety Brief: Junior Fire Camp

(Contributed by Tim Fleckinger) This past month, the Oak Island Fire Department hosted its annual **Fire Camp** for kids of various ages. It was again very successful and a pleasure to host. The kids got to learn the ins and outs of the trade and the tools we use on our emergency scenes. They all start off with a morning workout each day to prepare themselves physically for the tasks that day. We did workouts involving all aspects of fitness such as strength, flexibility and cardiovascular conditioning as well as some to teach them that they are stronger as a team than an individual in a lot of circumstances. I led them in these exercises and I have to say that I was impressed with all of them and the effort they put in!

As for their daily drills they did all kinds of evolutions in basic fireground skills. They learned how to properly use a fire extinguisher and how to give CPR. The kids then progressed to hose drags and applications of hose streams. They even got to experience how things were done way back when with a bucket brigade. The crews on shift each day showed them the apparatus that we use as well as the equipment on them. They got a front row seat of how we cut up a car when someone is entrapped. I'm sure they thought this was pretty cool because I know I do. Our friends at water rescue and the OIPD also spoke to them as we all work together at times to handle certain situations that arise. As stated before, we are stronger as a team working in unison. They also got to see an ambulance up close and personal in the best possible way...when you don't need them for an emergency. On the final day they got to showcase their skill and all the hard work they put in all week long to their families with a skills competition in which they were all victorious in playing hard and doing each skill well!

OIFD would like to thank and congratulate all of the kids who participated and the parents who entrusted us with them all week. It was great to meet them and work with them for the week. Its always nice for us, the fireman, to reach out and give back and in doing so effecting the lives of the next generation.

Just one safety reminder this month from us and that is to please remember to fill in your holes when you are getting ready to come off the beach. These do present a safety hazard to any unexpected person that finds themselves slip, trip or falling into one; we've already had to rescue one person who found themselves stuck in one with the tide rushing in. Even if it's not yours please take the time to fill them in, someone eventually will be very thankful you did! As stated, we are all much better off working together as a cohesive unit ensuring the safety of our residents and our visitors alike. OIFD wishes you to go out and enjoy the summertime festivities but do so safely.

Pledge The Pink Returns to Oak Island

(Contributed by Laura Morgan, Founder, Pledge the Pink) A phenomenon which has swept the southeast, drawing thousands from all points of the globe, Pledge the Pink is the second largest multi-day cancer event in the country. And from October 19-22 they are coming to Oak Island with all the fun, flair and festivities that have made it a must-attend for “FlockStars” everywhere.

Comprising three days of celebrations, with walking and running courses set up across Oak Island, Pledge the Pink will draw more than 1,500 registrants and hundreds of volunteers to Oak Island. As of this writing, with six months until the event, more than 1,200 participants have signed up, representing 48 states and 11 countries. They will come to test themselves on 33.1 miles of pathways, but there’s far more to Pledge the Pink than just getting some steps in.

While Pledge the Pink is all about fun, it’s also all about fundraising, as evidenced by The Flocks of Love which will be on display at Middleton Park all weekend long. With each flamingo standing for \$100 in funds raised, these rows upon rows of vibrant pink flamingos represent a sizable financial impact for cancer treatment and research. All told, 7,500 plastic garden flamingos will cover the ballpark in what Morgan hopes will set the Guinness World Record for largest flock (again).

Those looking to continue Oak Island’s outstanding support for Pledge the Pink are invited to come flock along and participate or volunteer. Assistance is needed with directing registrants along the courses, helping to set up The Flocks of Love flamingo display, passing out water and snacks, awarding medals to winners and more. Oak Island Sea Turtle Protection Program: Mid-Season Update

(Contributed by Suzan Bell) July is a busy month for sea turtles! We are halfway through our nesting season and as of this writing, we have 77 nests on Oak Island! We still have nesting turtles and soon we will have hatchlings beginning to emerge from the nests! Both are exciting events for visitors and locals alike. We hope that everyone will be respectful of our sea turtles and follow the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, the Oak Island Sea Turtle Protection Program, and the Town of Oak Island's protocols and procedures for helping to keep our sea turtles, wildlife, and the environment safe.

Did you know that it is a federal offense to disturb sea turtles? Please, if you see a nesting turtle, stand back, always behind her a minimum of 20 feet, do not shine red or white lights on her, do not touch her, or take flash photography of her. If disturbed, she will turn around and go back into the water without laying her nest. Please do not walk on our dunes per the Town of Oak Island. Some of our nests are on top of the dunes, where the nesting turtle crawled up and laid her clutch of eggs. Please do not walk up the dune to look at the nest. The Town of Oak Island has an ordinance against walking on the dunes and fines can be given out. There are lots of other nests on the beach to look at!

Although we do not share locations of our nests per the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission to make sure our sea turtles and volunteers are protected, cared for, and safe, if you see a nest with edging around it headed to the water, that nest is in the time frame for emergence. We invite you to bring a chair and sit with us in the evenings! Nest Parent volunteers will be there to speak with you and answer any questions! If hatchlings do emerge, please do not cross the line at the runway. Volunteers need a clear walkway to check to make sure the hatchlings make it to the water! Please do not use flash photography or lean over on top of the hatchling for a picture. There should not be any red or white lights on the hatchlings, the natural light is the very best for sea turtles! The hatchlings are looking for the horizon light and the crest of the waves so any other light can disorient them.

We appreciate everyone that cares for our turtles and their safety! Please call us 24 hours a day, 7 days a week if you see a nesting turtle or any hatchlings without a permitted volunteer at the nest! 910-945-8888. Thank you for helping us protect these threatened species on the Endangered Species List! We hope our 2023 Season continues to be successful! Brunswick Nuclear Plant: Siren Test on July 12

(Contributed by Duke Energy) The outdoor warning sirens around the Brunswick Nuclear Plant will be tested between **10:00 AM** and **11:00 AM** on **Wednesday, July 12, 2023**.

As part of our regular, quarterly testing, the 38 sirens within 10 miles of the Brunswick Nuclear Plant will sound for five to 30 seconds on July 12. To ensure they are functioning properly, it may be necessary to test some sirens more than once. Testing is performed in cooperation with emergency officials in Brunswick and New Hanover counties, who are responsible for sounding the sirens.

Because these are tests, local broadcasting stations will not interrupt regular programming to broadcast Emergency Alert System (EAS) messages. If there were ever a real emergency at the plant requiring the sirens to be sounded, local radio and television stations would broadcast information and instructions to the public.

With it being July and the middle of summer, one of the last things anyone is thinking about is the winter holiday season. However, since "*Christmas in July*" seems to be an effective campaign for retail shops, maybe it will work for some important Town announcements, too!

While the the Town's annual Tree Lighting ceremony and Holiday Craft Market are two favorite yuletide traditions, by far the biggest holiday draw is the ***Christmas By The Sea Parade***.

Traditionally held on the first Saturday in December, this event runs right right through the heart of Town down E Oak Island Drive, and hosts some of the largest crowds outside of Beach Day itself. In years past, the Parade was organized by the Southport-Oak Island Chambers of Commerce, in partnership with the Town.

For 2023 however, the Town has graciously accepted full-organizer status from the Chamber, and will be the sole sponsor and conductor of the Parade.

That changeover brings some new items of organization. In 2022 we saw the largest Parade ever, and we're only looking to improve upon those numbers in 2023! For even bigger and better things to come however, it's going to take everyone getting involved NOW.

This means the Town of Oak Island will now be the sole sponsor and organizer ALL events throughout the entire Holiday Festival Weekend, including the Tree Lighting Ceremony, the Holiday Craft Market, and now the Christmas By the Sea Parade.

So it may be white hot outside right now, but it's never too early to start dreaming of that white Christmas to come (or you know, at least the Parade part)! New Fire Engine: Arriving Soon

It's always fun to get shiny new things, and for the hard-working members of the Oak Island fire Department, it doesn't come any shinier than a brand new **Pierce Enforcer** fire engine!

On June 30, Oak Island fire Chief Lee Price received the latest build update on the Town's newest fire engine, a 2023 Pierce Enforcer. The new engine is being outfitted by [Atlantic Emergency Solutions](#), which is headquartered in Manassas, VA, and has been in production at their Appleton, WI facility since March of this year.

The new truck, which can carry 1,000 gallons of water and features a built-in foam delivery system, costs approximately \$850,000 and is essentially an up-fitted "stock" unit. Buying a stock unit allowed for a much quicker turnaround time than the 20-24 months typically seen on new orders. Note, this is the same tactic the Fire Department is using to locate and purchase its next fire engine, which it hopes to have by the end of this year.

Final touches should be completed early in July, after which representatives from the Oak Island Fire Department will travel to Appleton Wisconsin July 17 to see it in person. The truck should arrive to its new home at Oak Island Station 2 immediately following the Expo on August 12.

DEPARTMENT FEATURE: ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

You've seen it before, in classic westerns or action dramas. A lone hero rides into what might as well be a ghost town, ready save the few remaining souls still clinging on to whatever life is left in this rundown town. Broken doors and empty windows are everywhere, filled with only cobwebs, as the occasional tumbleweed rolls down the street. Somewhere you here a lone voice say *"this used to be a nice place to live."*

The "dried up town" is a common trope in TV or movies; and while it may make for a dramatic scene on TV, you don't have to look far to realize that there are places like that in real life. America is littered with near "ghost towns" that didn't recognize the changing of the times, who never adapted to new sources of economic growth, or tried to hold on too tightly to resources that slowly went extinct. However, there's usually a reason for this. It's not that anyone wants to see a town go under on purpose, they often just don't have someone dedicated to seeking out new and diverse avenues for economic development.



ENTER: Someone dedicated to seeking out new and diverse avenues for economic development.

While people may be the "life blood" of a community, it is the local economy that provides a community's heart. Businesses and industries employ people, which provides them with salaries that they spend at other businesses. An employee at the local bakery hires a plumber to fix their pipes, allowing the plumber to hire a carpenter to build their home, allowing the carpenter to pay a mechanic to fix their vehicle, a vehicle they then use to drive to the bakery for some donuts ... and let's be honest here, ***donuts benefit everybody!***

While that model works great, it isn't exactly "perpetual motion." It must occasionally be infused with new plumbers, bakers, carpenters, mechanics, and whole host of new businesses, along with new spaces for them to ply their trades. Even in a place as seemingly timeless as Oak Island, the economic tides can change quicker than the sands at ***The Point*** after a good storm! Anyone looking around today will probably tell you that ***tourism*** is the main "driving factor" in the local economy, but 75 years ago it was commercial fishing; and 75 years before that it was fox hunting! Having a person or group dedicated to keeping track of what is and isn't working for the local economy is the best way to ensure it stays healthy.

That's where the **Economic Development Office** comes in. Created in 2023, the office looks to do just as its name suggests, help to develop the economy in and around the Town of Oak Island. Economic Development is ***"the practice of improving a community's economic well-being and quality of life."*** It includes a broad range of activities to attract, create, and retain jobs and to foster a resilient economy. Simply put, this office will help to recruit and encourage new growth, balanced with retaining the character and charm traditionally found in the community's already established businesses.



PROFILE: Economic Development Coordinator Hallie Willis recently joined the Town of Oak Island staff in May, as the first-ever Economic Development Coordinator hired by the Town. Although new to the staff, Willis is certainly not new to Oak Island, as she grew up in Laurinburg, NC just a few hours west.

Hallie graduated from Meredith College in Raleigh, NC with a BA in International Politics; later heading for the coast, where she graduated from UNCW with an Master's of Public Administration.

That education opened the door for experience in several markets, as Willis has worked in the fields of Economic Development and marketing / tourism the Town of Wake Forest, NC, New Hanover County Government, and even Charlotte, NC.

No matter where the job takes her, she says the enjoyment from helping a community grow is always the same.

"The basic goals behind Economic Development are simple - attracting new business, retaining existing business, and growing existing business." Willis says of her profession. "I'm passionate about putting in the work with business owners to help achieve those goals and improve the quality of life for our community."

In her brief time with the Town so far, Hallie Willis has already been making great strides to reach out and connect with the business community. However, when she's not in the office or out meeting prospective business owners, she enjoys time at home with her dog, an 8-year-old West Highland Terrier named Archie.

While there isn't a dedicated staff for Hallie Willis, the Economic Development Office does have several tools at its disposal. Resources like the Town's [Business Directory](#), along with marketing campaigns, census and demographics data, and even [commercial property listings](#) are all things that can be utilized to leverage growth. The Economic Development Office will use these tools, and regularly collaborate with local stakeholders, to provide guidance and resources to help other businesses thrive. Because like in the "baker to mechanic" analogy above, the more one business thrives, the more every business can thrive.

GROW WITH US. Oak Island boasts a thriving and supportive business community, fostering an environment that encourages growth, collaboration, and entrepreneurship. The Town's strategic location along the stunning North Carolina coastline also presents excellent opportunities to tap into a steady stream of tourists and visitors, providing a built-in customer base for various industries. With the customers already here, economic growth depends on identifying what those customers want to see when they are here. What goods, services, and industries fit their needs, and would encourage them to seek out and stay in this community? The Economic Development Office's [Grow Your Business](#) campaign aims to answer those questions, by providing a Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) Program to connect with entrepreneurs who feel their trades are needed in this community.



TOURISM COUNTS. For an attractive coastal destination like the Oak Island area, tourism and travel are essential in stimulating economic growth, cultivating vibrant communities, creating job opportunities, encouraging new businesses, and elevating the quality of life for residents who enjoy the area every day. In fact, many of the area's facilities and infrastructure would not exist without the tourism industry. While Brunswick County has and will continue to experience growth, it takes more than the current full-time resident population to support the multiple grocery stores, improved parks, and recreation facilities alone. The The Chamber of Commerce's Tourism Counts campaign works to capitalize on that influx of the tourist population each year. Utilizing the resource of tourism helps to build the infrastructure that attracts more visitors, while at the same time supporting more amenities for year round residents.

From seeking out new opportunities, to keeping track of current development projects, the Office takes a "whole community" approach to both attracting new business and preserving what's currently established. While the Economic Development Office is still a new department within the Town's administration, the obvious benefits it already provides is undeniable.
